We sat down with him for a better understanding on how he impacts his community and how SigEp empowered him to do so.

"Jordan Valley Community Health Center is a non-profit organization that serves low-income people that can't find medical attention anywhere else" says Nathan. He recognized the importance of these establishments in the community and how they push important medical programs like the use of clean needles and safe sex. "As a low-income non-profit, we were always strapped for technological resources, that being getting any computer upgrades to providers or just keeping the most modern technology for our system" says Nathan. While in the face of adversity, he worked with what he had and fell back to experiences that SigEp gave him.

"Through being SigEp's financial chair my junior year, I learned how to budget well and how to allocate limited resources" says Nathan. As SigEp's financial chair, Nathan had to balance checkbooks, work with members on dues, and handle accounts with over \$10,000. He applied these valuable lessons to do what he loves every day, helping people and working with technology.

Beyond his work in IT, Nathan highlighted other valuable lessons he learned during his time in SigEp.
