Arkansas Tech University's Order of Omega Zeta Sigma recently held their annual Greek Week, which benefits the River Valley Advocacy Center, Marva, and River Valley Food 4 Kids. Together, Greek Life donated over \$43,000 worth of food and hygiene items for the local community. Arkansas Epsilon chapter of SigEp paired with Zeta Tau Alpha to form a team to compete in the annual Greek games. Star players such a Brayden Gilmore and Jeremy Tharp led their team to the playoffs and then to the final, where they took the gold handily. As a team, SigEp and Zeta had over 50 volunteers work for Marva cleaning up fencerows, picking up trash, and raking leaves for over two hours. During the donation day of Greek week, SigEp and Zeta donated over 1,500 food items to help Zeta Sigma's selected organizations. Although SigEp and Zeta didn't win Greek Week, the area-wide impact made every second worthwhile.

# SigEp and Kappa Sigma team up for an eventful philanthropy week.

SigEp and Kappa Sigma's philanthropy week started April 12<sup>th</sup> at the Hindsman Belltower with a Canned Food and Penny drive. After the first day, Sigma Pi and Delta Zeta both had over a 30-point lead on the rest of Greek Life. The second day, Delta Zeta took a 130-point lead over the other sororities and Alpha Tau Omega staged a massive comeback by making a 120-point gap between themselves and the rest of the fraternizes. During the third day, Delta Zeta continued to gap other sororities with almost a 200-point lead while Alpha Tau Omega held onto their 120-point lead. A scheduled volleyball tournament was moved to April 14<sup>th</sup> and all the teams were ready to play. The first round left only four teams: Zeta Tau Alpha, El- Pass-O, Delta Zeta, and Donald Bump. In the semi-finals El-Pass-O and Delta Zeta made guick work of the challengers, sweeping Zeta Tau Alpha and Donald Bump. El-Pass-O pulled together in the championship for a 3-set sweep. The last and final day of the Penny Wars, tension began over who would take home gold. It was a race to see who could bring the most change. Zeta Tau Alpha staged a massive comeback thirty minutes before the end of the competition, putting a 1000-point gap between them and other sororities. Alpha Tau Omega held onto their lead to join Zeta Tau Alpha in winning gold for the most funds raised for River Valley Food 4 Kids. Together, SigEp and Kappa Sigma's Philanthropy week raised over 1,200 in cash and food items.

We sat down with him to figure out how he managed these hard times and how it helped prepare him for life after college.

After graduation, Little took a Graduate Assistant position over student organizations and OnTrack at Arkansas Tech University. Through this position, Little facilitates events student organizations on campus put on by making sure they register events through Tech's software and reaches out to Tech's student body for feedback on what events are wanted on campus. "I work with students and faculty. I work with students who are creating the organizations and then I work with faculty to facilitate events and make sure everything is running smoothly on that side of things," said Little.

The On-Track program is a co-curricular experience designed to enhance student development beyond the classroom setting, encourage students to network socially among peers and include students in traditional university events. On-Track has sub-programs that focus on an active mind and body, advancement in careers, growing leadership qualities, staying informed about global events, and how to navigate through life financially.
